Key indicator 2: Are ALL children meeting the Chief Medical Officer's 30 minutes of physical activity every day in school? Physical activity involves any form of bodily movement that uses energy. This can take place within the curriculum as part of an active pedagogy approach across all subjects and in taking regular activity breaks to reduce sitting time. It also takes place outside of the curriculum through break and lunchtimes, extra-curricular clubs and active travel.				Cost/Percentage of total allocation:

All children in school will have 2 hours per week allocated within curriculum time to do physical activity. Children's views regarding the PE curriculum are considered. Year 4 children will have the opportunity to have swimming lessons weekly throughout the academic year. Children are educated about the importance of keeping fit and being active. They understand how physical health affects mental health. Sports values are promoted - fairness, teambuilding, equality, discipline, inclusion, perseverance and respect. Children's level of physical activity is increased.	Purchase play equipment for the KS1 and the KS2 playground to be used at lunch and playtime. Conduct pupil voice exercise to gather children's views/suggestions about the PE lessons and activities on offer in school. Play leaders to guide play using this equipment.
